### Herald Year-in-review

As we wind down this year, it's only natural that we take a look back at the nine cover stories we published. We started the year with our annual Public Affairs and Religious Liberty issue and ended with an exploration of the ministry of the disabled. In between, of course, was the pandemic, now reaching 300,000 U.S. deaths and the recent welcome news of vaccines slowly beginning to roll out across our nation.

Our May issue gave the definitive accounts of how the coronavirus skuttled normal plans for our churches, schools (K-20) and hospital system. In the June/July issue, we reported on the miraculous Covid-19 recovery of a prominent Berrien Springs physician. 


